About the speakers

Robin Daniels is Head of Tees Archaeology, the Archaeology Service for Teesside and has published a number of papers on different aspects of medieval rural and urban settlement in the area. He has just completed a book on Medieval Hartlepool and previously published one on the Anglo-Saxon Monastery of St Hilda at Hartlepool.

Barry Harrison was a Lecturer in local and regional history in the Department of Continuing Education University of Leeds from 1966 until his retirement in 1999. He has lived in Cleveland since 1962. His main research interests lie in landscape and building history. He is the current Chair of Cleveland and Teesside Local History Society.

Mark Whyman is a retired personnel manager with a deep interest in architectural history. His interest in architecture led him to consider the relationship between the country house and its garden and park and hence an interest in garden history. He is a member of the Garden History Society, Yorkshire Gardens Trust and the Society of Architectural Historians of Great Britain. Publications include, *Richmond at the start of the 21st Century*, an urban landscape study. In 2009 he won the James Heriot Photographic Competition, completed the second volume of *The Last Pennymans of Ormesby*, and was briefly featured in a Radio 3 programme about Michael Tippett, the composer's, work in East Cleveland during the 1930s.

Gill Cookson was county editor of the Durham VCH, 1999-2009, and now works for herself as a heritage consultant. She has published widely on regional and industrial history, especially about Yorkshire and the North East.

She is an honorary research fellow in the history department at Durham University, and active in the Whitby Lit. & Phil. and the Yorkshire Vernacular Buildings Group.

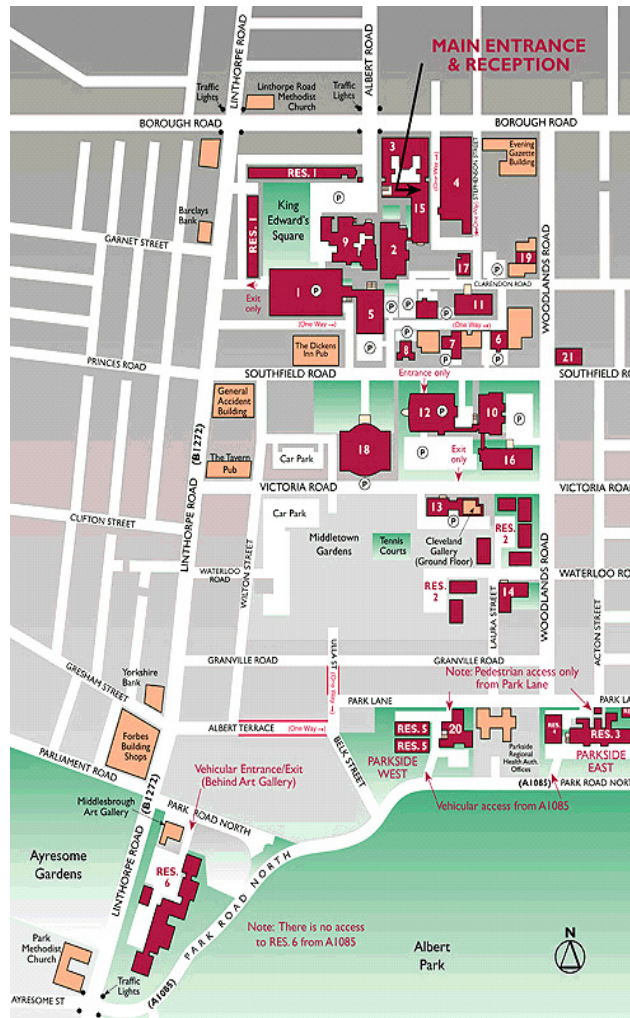
